between these two sides, the Catalans of the Super League were given a searching examination by the Championship side Toulouse, who led for almost half the game. Both sides had plenty to be positive about, despite the high score suggesting some laxness in defence. For the Catalans, new signing Dallas Johnson made an impressive first performance in a team which was seeking to improve on last week's narrow home defeat to Castleford. Toulouse's first outing for four months saw coach Gilles Dumas rotating 21 players, among whom their new signing from the Catalans, Vincent Duport, made a solid start in the centre, though their on-loan back-rower from Leeds, Simon Worrall, suffering from a groin strain, was not risked.

In an excellent match played in front of a more than satisfactory 4,000-plus crowd, the Catalans put out their first-choice starting line-up, with only Jean-Philippe Baile and Dane Carlaw missing from the seventeen, but it was Toulouse who had the better of the early exchanges.

"There was a stiff wind against us and Toulouse played good football in the first half," said Catalans' coach Kevin Walters. "Although they scored 22 points, two of their tries came from quality kicks. Our ball retention was much better. There were no real standouts – it was a good team performance and most of the boys played better this second time out. We still have work to do over the next two weeks. We understand that it will be tough fin the opening Super League match at Wakefield]."

France skipper Olivier Elima gave e Catalans a quick lead, the nversion coming from Thomas Bosc, who was named as the Dragons' new team captain in place of the departed Greg Bird. Toulouse replied almost immediately when their former captain Sylvain Houlès, who has given way to Eric Anselme, capitalised on Constant Villegas's kick and went over from 25 metres, shrugging off Clint Greenshields's tackle on the way.

Nathan Wynn could not add the goal, but the home side moved ahead when Martin Mitchell, who was a key figure in the middle of the field, darted across the line, before Sébastien Payan contributed Toulouse's third. Wynn converted both tries to put the Championship side, showing the solidarity which their recent

commando training camp had been intended to produce, into a 16-6 lead. The Catalans hit back and, after Greenshields's converted try had reduced the deficit, Steven Bell's touchdown brought the teams level at the interval.

Straight after the break, numberless Kevin Larroyer, who had displayed good form on loan to St Gaudens, showed a fine turn of speed to beat all others to the touch down, Wynn again converting.

But after Guisset went under the posts from first receiver for a try goaled by Bosc, bringing the sides level again on the 48th minute, the Dragons monopolised the scoring.

Greenshields linked up with the threequarter line to score his second, goaled by Bosc, before Sébastien Raguin made use of Bosc's chip to serve Bell, who went in for his second at the corner.

The power of the Dragons' forwards had started to take its toll on the Toulouse defence, which shipped six second-half tries. Greg Mounis was next to find the line, going over from close range, while a productive final quarter for Raguin ended with the former Toulouse man benefiting from Setainata Sa's drop-off and then, at the final hooter, crashing over for his second
